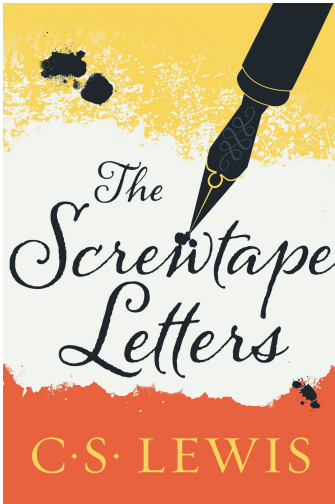
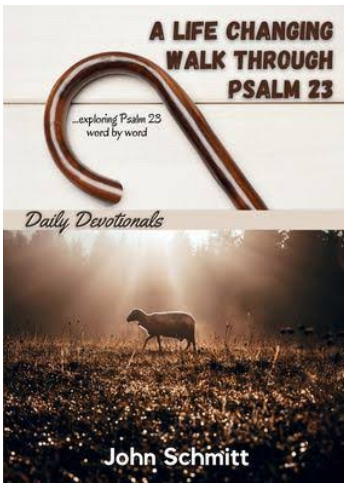

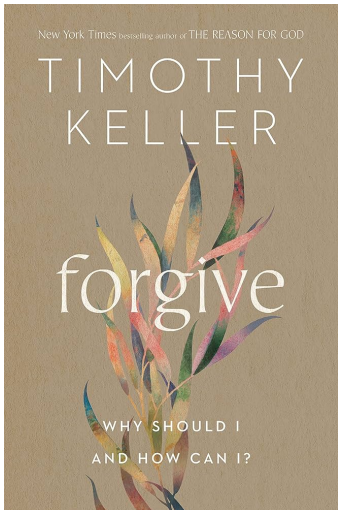
"Screwtape Letters" by C.S. Lewis

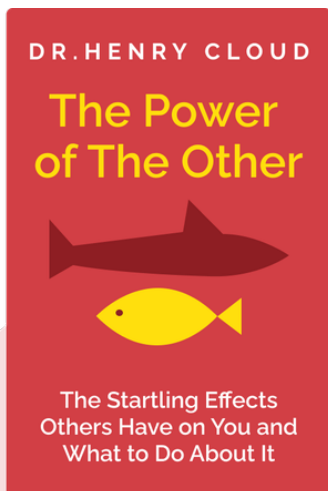
"A Life Changing Walk Through Psalm 23" by John Schmitt

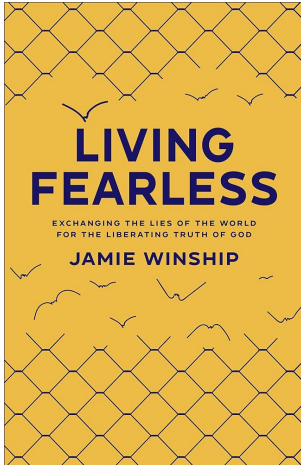
"Forgiveness" by Timothy Keller

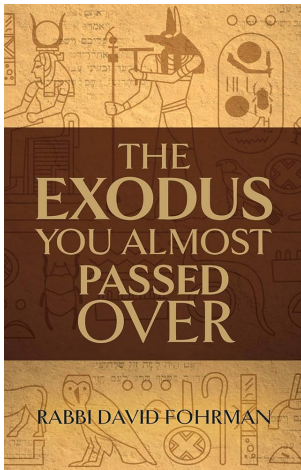
"The Power of the Other" by Dr. Henry Cloud

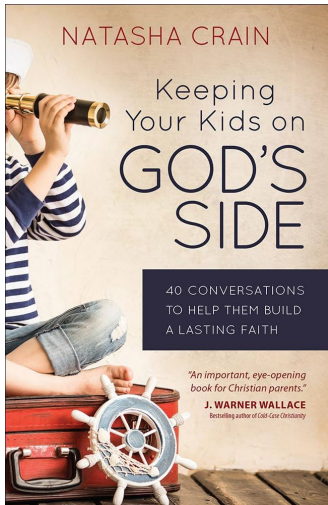
“Living Fearless” by Jamie Winship

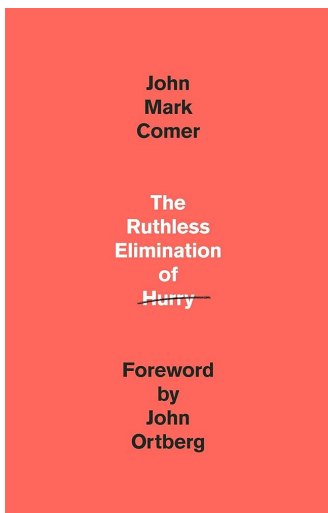
“The Exodus you almost passed over” by Rabbi David Fohrman

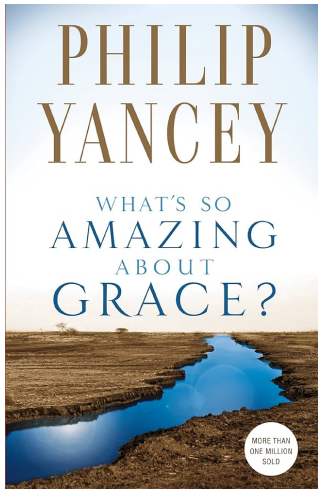
"Keeping kids on God's side" by Natasha Crane

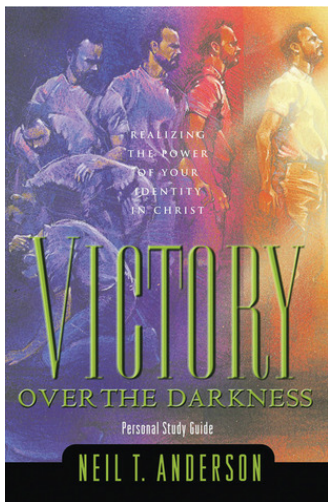
"The Ruthless Elimination of Hurry" by John Mark Comer

“What’s so amazing about grace?” by Phillip Yancey

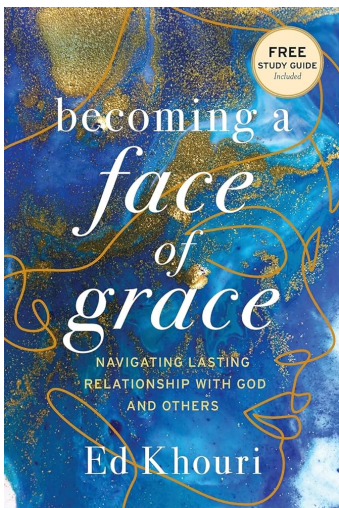
